
#### Introduction

The Regional District of Central Kootenay partnered with the Village of Nakusp, the Village of Kaslo, and the Town of Creston as part of the Central Kootenays' Integrated Community Sustainability Planning process.

SustainABLE Central Kootenay gathered input and engaged citizens in a dialogue about sustainability in our region. It is the start of an ongoing dialogue that will help shape our future, so it is important to hear what our residents are thinking.

In the fall of 2009, Regional District residents participated in a survey that gathered community input on seven themes that have surfaced as regional priorities to our sustainability vision. This was one of many similar input opportunities that occurred across the region.

This input from residents will help to guide our Official Community Plan and ongoing discussions on sustainability in the Regional District. It will also help guide the development of a greenhouse gas emissions target for our region.






# Community Feedback Questionnaire Results

## Economic Development

The graph below shows how residents would like to see economic development supported in the RDCK. There is community agreement that future economic activity should be pursued in tandem with environmental preservation, though the community is divided in terms of what that would look like in the context of our region. Some residents feel that we should not be attracting resource based industries to our region, be they renewable (19%) or non-renewable (31%) in nature. Over half feel that renewable resource industries such as forestry are an important part of our future economic reality (62%), and nearly half are not in support of any extraction based industries, such as mining (41%). Diversifying away from resource based industry is an attractive option for residents, who strongly support local agriculture (83%), and generally support knowledge (74%), tourism (59%), and small business (57%) based economic activity. This should happen in a way that supports community vibrancy and not big-box type development patterns (83%).



## Health and Social Well-Being


A high quality of health and social well-being is a priority to residents. There was strong support to ensure our communities welcome and attract a diversity of people, provide a diversity of housing types, and are welcome to seniors, youth, and people with disabilities in well services areas (84%). This level of interest was also shown for supporting town centers, formal recreation opportunities like pools and sports fields. The overwhelming majority indicated support for maintaining and developing 'informal recreation' facilities (such as hiking trails, picnic areas, back-country ski trails, etc.) and a desire for regional healthcare services that would allow us to treat common medical conditions locally. The graph below illustrates how residents were slightly less enthusiastic on supporting affordable housing and services for mentally ill, though still feel these issues deserve attention and resources.

## Energy and Climate Change


Residents in the Central Kootenays are united when it comes to issues of energy and climate change. Ninety percent of residents share the opinion that new buildings should be designed to a high standard of energy efficiency and that Saving energy and reducing our greenhouse gas emissions should be a priority to all energy users. Over eighty percent would like to see more services for recycling, small scale renewable energy systems, energy upgrades for existing buildings, and feel that the region should work towards becoming recognized leaders in energy efficiency and climate change.

## Water Use


The community is in full agreement that all residents should have access to safe, clean drinking water (97%) and that development and resource-related activity in watersheds should be undertaken in a sensitive manner that respects the watershed (93%). Residents largely feel that water conservation should be a priority to all water users (87%), high quality, clean potable water should not be used for irrigation (72%), on-site storm water infiltration (67%), and that we should allocate resources to maintain and upgrade our existing water infrastructure, rather than taking on additional water infrastructure liability (72%). The community was less certain about residents paying for the water they use (55% for and 25% against).

## Transportation


RDCK residents are largely in support of finding new ways to move around the region more efficiently. This includes support for daily use of transit and car sharing (94%), and bikes and pedestrian paths (95%). Communities should also be linked with more frequent public transit (93%). Resident also commented on how development patters should evolve in order to support sustainable transportation. Residents agree that development should be concentrated near town centers (75%), houses should be built along existing roads rather than building new roads and neighbourhoods (70%), and that local roads should to be more welcoming to pedestrians (74%).

## Natural Areas


Residents agree that a variety of steps should be taken to protect the natural areas on the region. From protecting natural areas from negative impacts of recreational use (92%), to limiting the use of harmful pesticides (86%) and limiting development along streams and lakeshores (82%), residents are in support of acting in a manner that protects and enhances the environment. The only area where the community is divided relates to trees on private land. Only 24% of residents agree that private land owners should not be allowed to cut down trees on their properties without permission, while 50% disagree.

## Food and Agricultural Land

Residents are largely unified when it comes to supporting local food and agriculture. Residents agree that agricultural land should be protected from development and used in an environmentally sensitive manner (89%). There was also a consensus that residents should have more opportunities for residents to cultivate their own food and be able to purchase local food (89%). While still in agreement, residents were slightly less certain about small farm animals being allowed in backyards (72%).
